

Springside Elementary 2016-17 Trustlands Grant Summary

The School LAND Trust program brings tens of millions of dollars annually to academic programs in public schools across Utah. The funds are generated from school trust lands. Each year the School Community Council develops a plan to improve student academic performance in areas of most critical need. This plan is approved by the local school board and money is granted directly to the school. In 2016-17 Springside Elementary was granted \$60,082 to improve student learning in the areas of literacy and math. These funds were spent in a variety of areas including:

- Teacher Aides to provide interventions for students.
- 136 Chromebook computers to provide student access to intervention programs
- Leveled books for a take-home reading library
- Professional development for teachers
- MasteryConnect software to track student progress
- Materials and supplies to support literacy and math

Academic Goals 2016-17

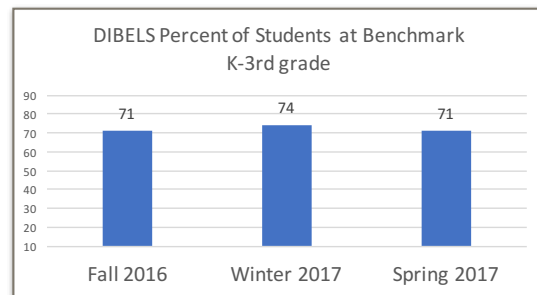
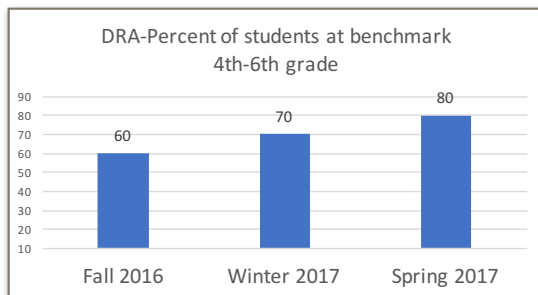
Literacy

The percentage of students who reach reading benchmark will increase by 3% from Fall 2016 to Spring 2017. This will be measured with DIBELS scores in grades K-3 and with DRA scores in grades 4-6.

Math

10% of students below proficiency on SAGE will reach proficiency in the area of math.

Did we meet our goals?



13% of students who were below proficiency on the SAGE math assessment moved to a proficient level on the Spring 2017 SAGE.
